



94% of new jobs will be in service industries










...so graduates are finding it more difficult to get a job...


As almost half of all new jobs will require a bachelor degree or higher qualification

Australia, 25 to 34 year olds





How are graduates finding employment?










Position advertised through internet Networking through family and friends, and university contacts Directly approached employer or was approached by employer University careers services or job fairs

Applications need to:



Be targeted to the position Use clear and concise language

Look professional

Employers spend an average of 6 seconds reading a résumé

Be well researched

Cover the key job requirements

Have perfect spelling and grammar


